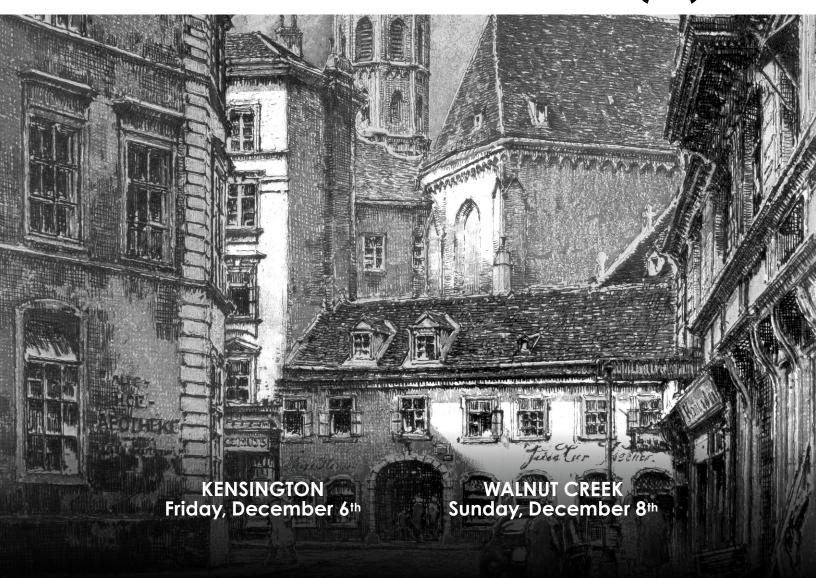


VIENNESE INFLUENCE(R)S



PROGRAM NOTES

Vienna enjoyed its status as the glittering cultural and political capital of a great empire for centuries. The sponsorship of the centuries-long Habsburg dynasty and many aristocrats of the imperial court created an excellent environment for musicians and artists to marinate in creativity. Great music begets more great music, and subsequent generations of students came to study with the likes of some of the greatest teachers of classical music, already fixtures in the Viennese music scene: Haydn, Bruckner, and later, Schoenberg, to name but a few.

The city remains just as synonymous with classical music today, and countless musicians have found in a Viennese pilgrimage what Mozart called an "irrational affection" in a letter to his father. For my predecessor, Cindy Beitmen, who conducted the Contra Costa Chorale from 2012 until her passing in 2024, a six-year stay in Vienna proved incredibly formative, shaping a storied career as teacher, performer, mentor, and conductor. The influenced becomes the influencer, and the Chorale celebrates that legacy in performance today.

The text for the *Zigeunerlieder* (Gypsy Songs) of Johannes Brahms came to him by way of Hugo Conrat, a member of the composer's circle in Vienna. Conrat received these texts from the family's Hungarian nurse, set them to metric verse, and gave them to Brahms, already well known for his *Hungarian Dances* composed some fifteen years prior. Brahms set the text as a song cycle in 1888, and liked them so much he set portions again for solo voice and piano.

By Virginia Woolf's keen observation, "for most of history, anonymous was a woman." Unfortunately, classical music has been no exception, and the life and works of Marianna von Martines have lain in relative obscurity until only recently. Martines enjoyed an elevated status during her lifetime, in part due to her family's status within the noble classes, but also for her musical talents, which were noticed and developed by her keyboard teacher, Franz Joseph Haydn, and voice teacher Niccola Porpora. She performed often

for the court of the Empress Maria Theresa and was the first woman admitted to the Accademia Filharmonica of Bologna. The *Dixit Dominus* was composed for the occasion of her admittance into the Accademia, but because Martines could not be present to oversee its premiere performance, the work was never performed in her lifetime.

For the classical music lover, the image of the archetypical composer is often of one steeped in deep thoughts, tormented by inward struggle and a yearning desire to be understood. Viennese composers, particularly in death, are often subjected to a biographical edification that creates an entirely different persona from the one that actually lived, composed, and died. Philosophers speak of "Two Beethovens:" the Beethoven born in Bonn and active in Vienna in the early nineteenth century, and the Beethoven we have created in retrospect: tormented by a debilitating hearing loss that rendered him nearly unable to hear the very art he created in his final decades. Not far into his thirties, Beethoven was well aware of his increasing hearing loss and the toll it would take on his ability to compose. Jake Runestad's "A Silence Haunts Me" describes this inner turmoil by using an adaptation of the Heiligenstadt Testament, a letter written by Beethoven to his brothers, in which he describes his current mental state and bleak prognosis. Listen for familiar themes from Beethoven's later works in this piece, including reference to the Moonlight Sonata, the 3rd, 6th, and 9th Symphonies, and Creatures of Prometheus, all "filtered through a hazy, frustrated, and defeated state of being," as described by Runestad. We pair this work, without pause, with the final "Hallelujah" movement of Beethoven's oratorio, Christus am Ölberge, or Christ on the Mount of Olives. Written on the heels of the letter to his brothers, many have seen this oratorio as a metaphor for Beethoven's life and ultimate triumph over his hearing loss just as much as it reflects the inner struggle of Christ.

On behalf of the Chorale, thank you for joining us today as we pay musical homage to the many Viennese Influencers who have shaped our own musicking.

DR BRAD SCHULTZ ~ ARTISTIC DIRECTOR



Dr. Brad Schultz became the Artistic Director of the Contra Costa Chorale beginning with the Fall 2024 season. A native of Minnesota, Brad's musical background includes vocal and instrumental performance and conducting, church and community music making, university teaching and public musicology.

Brad is also the minister of music at St. Stephen's Episcopal Church in Belvedere, where he directs the sanctuary choir, plays the organ, and organizes a concert series. He has previously served United Methodist, Unitarian Universalist, Lutheran, and Presbyterian congregations in Oregon, Iowa, Minnesota, Idaho, and Georgia. In addition to his duties with the Chorale and in Belvedere, Brad lectures on music topics at the Belvedere-Tiburon Public Library and is an associate faculty member at

Santa Rosa Junior College, with appointments in the music and lifelong learning departments.

Brad holds a Ph.D. in Musicology from the University of Oregon with a certificate in Historical Performance Practice. His dissertation focuses on the keyboard works of Jan Pieterszoon Sweelinck, a composer active in Amsterdam in the early seventeenth century, through lenses of embodied cognition, rhetoric, and organology (the study of musical instruments).

Brad also teaches online music courses for the University of Oregon and previously served on the faculty of Luther College in Decorah, Iowa. He performs regularly as an organist, collaborative keyboardist and continuo player, and conductor, and enjoys making music with other musicians in the Bay Area. He received a Master's of Sacred Music degree in organ performance from Emory University and Candler School of Theology in Atlanta, GA, and a Bachelor's degree in tuba performance from Luther College. He lives in Tiburon with his husband Matt, a digital advertising consultant.

MARTIN MORLEY ~ COLLABORATIVE KEYBOARD ARTIST



A native of Montana, Martin Morley has enjoyed a multifaceted career as a pianist, music therapist, teacher, handbell clinician, and conductor. He holds Bachelor's and Master's degrees in piano performance from the University of Kansas, where he studied with Flora Chiarrapa Silini, Richard Angeletti, and Portuguese

virtuoso Sequeira Costa; in addition, Martin performed for six years in monthly master classes with

such luminaries as Gary Graffman, Byron Janis, and Leon Fleisher. He has toured North America as an accompanist for Columbia Artists Management and been featured as a concerto soloist with orchestras in Kansas, California, and Texas. His keyboard comedy routines have slain audiences in several states. Martin is on the Master Artists roster of the Contra Costa Performing Arts Society, and has performed several times in benefit concerts for the Hope Solutions organization and for the Young People's Symphony Orchestra. In addition to his position as Director of Worship and Music at Our Savior's Lutheran Church in Lafayette, Martin teaches private lessons and continues performing as a soloist and collaborative pianist in the Bay Area and beyond.

Lori Panossian - Soprano



Dr. Lori Panossian is a versatile lyric soprano, classically trained, whose rich, three-octave vocal range enables her to perform a wide variety of styles. Her repertoire includes operatic arias, choral music, Armenian traditional folk songs, jazz and pop. Off the stage, Lori practices as a medical doctor, specializing in neurology and sleep

Kathleen Moss, mezzo soprano, has been recognized as a singer with a "great voice and projection" and "a dramatic ability seldom seen on the opera stage." Ms. Moss has performed with many Bay Area opera companies including San Francisco Opera, Opera San Jose, West Bay Opera, West Edge Opera, Fremont Opera, Livermore Valley Opera, Berkeley Opera, San

Francisco Lyric Opera, Cinnabar Opera & Pocket Opera and as a former Resident Artist with the San Francisco Opera Center.

Her concert engagements include solo appearances with the Sacramento Choral Society & Orchestra, Stockton Symphony, Fremont Symphony, Mendocino Music Festival, UC Berkeley Symphony Orchestra, Bay Choral Guild, Masterworks Chorale, Handel Opera Project, Camerata California, San Francisco Opera Guild and a live concert broadcast on National Public Radio.

As a crossover artist, she most recently appeared as Princess Puffer in The Mystery of Edwin Drood with Lamplighters Music Theatre. She has also performed with American Musical Theater of San Jose, 42nd Street Moon, TheatreWorks, Lyric Theatre of San Jose, Sacramento's Music Circus, Montalvo Arts Center & Shakespeare Santa Cruz. She can also be heard on the original cast recording of The 3 Musketeers, featuring Tony Award winners Sutton Foster & Christian Borle.

Mitch Ashley - Tenor



Mitch Ashley, an East Bay native, has sung with the Contra Costa Chorale since 2017, and is very excited to have been chosen as tenor soloist in Brad's premiere concert with the group. He considers himself fortunate to have performed in the Chorale under Cindy Beitmen, as a soloist in Mozart's *Requiem* in Fall 2023, and in

Bernstein's *Chichester Psalms* in Fall 2019, as well as other Chorale concerts.

Mitch began his classical singing study with Eleanor Cohen at Cal State Hayward (now CSU East Bay), and completed his Bachelor's and Master's in Music at San Francisco Conservatory, under the guidance of Hermann LeRoux. He has sung with the San Francisco Symphony and Opera choruses, the Philharmonia Baroque Orchestra Chorale, as well as many other Bay Area groups, and is currently the baritone leader in the Choir of St. John's Episcopal in Ross.

Greg Lassonde – Bass



Greg has been a member of Contra Costa Chorale for 10 years. Aside from singing with family, church and in grade school, his only other formal singing in community was one year in high school. Not an instrument player, except a year of piano in second grade, Greg appreciated not having to audition to join the

Chorale, only needing the ability to match tones.

In trying out for today's solo performance in quartet, Greg perceived this more as a personal challenge rather than an anticipated outcome. He is thankful for this opportunity, with special appreciation for the training these past two years from his vocal coach, Mary Ellen Callaghan, on top of instruction given from Cindy Beitmen and Brad Schultz during a decade of chorus rehearsals. CONTRA COSTA CHORALE COMMUNITY CONNECTIONS

The Contra Costa Chorale commits to promoting music education at all learning levels, to encouraging student participation in the fine and joyous art of choral singing, and to creating and supporting programs that build choral singers and audiences for the future.

For the past decade, the Contra Costa Chorale has raised funds to support student music programs in Contra Costa County, with the intent to focus on choral music in western and central parts of the county. Currently we have two active programs and are developing other opportunities.

OPENING ACT

Since 2017, the Chorale has invited student musicians' groups from Central and West Contra Costa schools to perform as our Opening Act. By the time the Chorale ceased operations during the COVID-19 pandemic, we had featured students from Madera Elementary School (WCCUSD) in Kensington, Orinda Middle School (Orinda Union School District) in Walnut Creek, Korematsu Middle School (WCCUSD), and Dougherty Valley High School (San Ramon Valley Unified School District). We are not always successful in finding groups for each concert, but when we do find those whose schedules fit ours, the performances are enthusiastically received by our audiences.

School music groups you know could have the opportunity to perform for up to 10 minutes in front of our audience, in either Kensington or Walnut Creek. VOCAL MUSIC STUDIES SCHOLARSHIPS

In 2020, the Contra Costa Chorale established a relationship with the West Contra Costa Public Education Fund (the Ed Fund) to provide scholarships to students who need assistance for studies, either at college or for some special program they wish to pursue even while still attending high school. Currently, the emphasis is on college scholarships, which the Ed Fund has made available on behalf of the Chorale since 2021.

In 2021, two \$1,000 scholarships were awarded to Madison Weller, De Anza HS, and Naja Ji Jaga, Middle College HS. Madison pursued her college studies at Contra Costa College with plans to transfer to San Jose State, and Naja began her studies at Boston University.

Another two \$1,000 scholarships were awarded in 2022 to Abraham Blanquel, Richmond HS, and Justin Trujillo, Pinole Valley HS. Both students intend to

pursue music careers, Abraham as a musician and in production and Justin as a music teacher—we hope in WCCUSD.

For the 2023 scholarships, the Community Connections Committee made the decision to increase the scholarship amounts to \$2,000 each, generating greater interest from the students. With a strong choice of candidates, the committee decided to award three scholarships. That year, the scholars were Kaylee Barron, Richmond HS; Jordan Daniel, Hercules HS; and Aleks Retiro, De Anza HS. Kaylee and Aleks presented the Chorale's Opening Act at the spring 2023 concert.

The spring 2024 scholarships were awarded to Sheesam Gurung, Pinole Valley HS; and Zidane Le, Hercules HS. Both students brought strong backgrounds in activities that reflected community building...and, of course, singing.

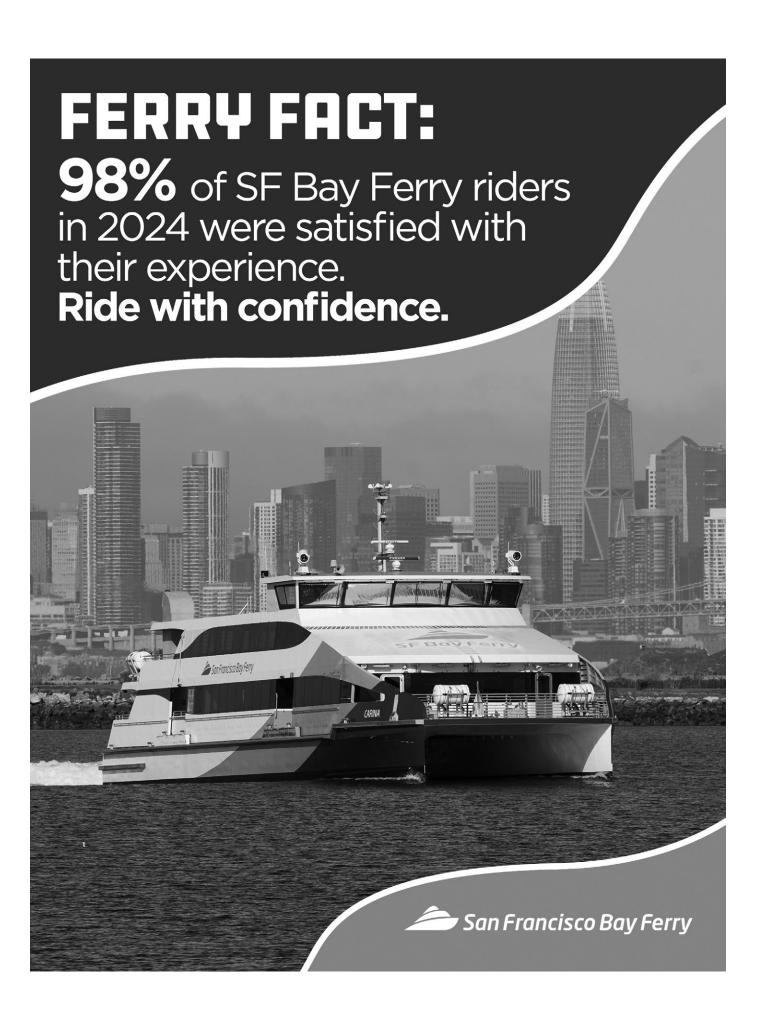

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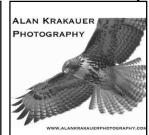






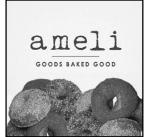














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Announcing the Cindy Beitmen Legacy Circle
